My guide through this month's theme is the work of Wayne Muller in his book, Sabbath: Finding Rest, Renewal, and Delight in our Busy Lives. I invite you to join me this month in finding "sacred rest to refresh our bodies and minds, restore our creativity, and regain our birthright of inner happiness."

News From Your Board

This month you will be asked for approval to take the next steps on our journey toward realizing the dream WUU had 25 years ago: to have proper facilities for our children to learn, to play, to become their unique spiritual beings. We added to that dream this past year for space to make our entire mission more attainable.

The Board committees have worked diligently to put a building plan in place and consider all the implications, such as financial and spatial. Having now approved the results of their work, the Board requests that you, too, approve, allowing WUU to move forward in our mission and vision.

Therefore, the Board asks you to put these two dates and times on your calendars:

Sunday, September 14th at 11:15 am – For discussion of all things related to a possible building program, including the recent Financial Feasibility study. This discussion will be monitored by the Board President with the expertise of Committee Chairs Les Solomon; chair of Building Our Future, Jim Kent, chair of Finance; Roger Guernsey, chair of the Design/Build team; and Allen Cooke, chair of the Financial Feasibility/Capital Campaign team there to share information and respond to your concerns and questions.

Sunday, September 21st from 10:15 to 10:45 am, between the two services, plan to stay late if you attend the 9:15 service; plan to come early if you attend the 11:15 service – for the official Congregational Meeting to vote on the following motion which will be presented by the Board:

The Congregation of the Williamsburg Unitarian Universalists authorizes the WUU Board and its Committees, including the Building Our Future (BOF) Task Force:

- to initiate a capital campaign for funding construction and associated costs of Phase I of the Master Plan as presented by Guernsey Tingle Architects on May 18, 2014;

- to commission a final Phase I sanctuary building addition design by Guernsey Tingle Architects.

This final design, including costs, shall be presented to the WUU congregation for approval after bids for construction are received.

You will also be asked to support a Chalice Lighter Grant Application to fund a capital campaign.

With limited time on the 21st, discussion about these motions will be short. Therefore, please attend the discussion session on the 14th when time is not an issue.

Should you be unable to attend this important congregational meeting, absentee ballots will be available from the office and at the September 14th discussion session.

These decisions come once in a generation or two; please be part of their making.

Childcare will be available during both the discussion session and the Congregational Meeting.

Stones of Compassion




In this, our 25th year, I asked the congregation to commit 25 "Acts of Compassion." I charged you with this task by giving you each a small jar of 25 colored gems.




Share the plate Sunday, September 7 - Literacy for Life

Literacy for Life provides valuable services to the greater Williamsburg community in many meaningful ways. As an independent 501(c)3 organization, Literacy for Life has been working for nearly 40 years to provide literacy services to help community members function more effectively. It is the only organization in the area that provides individualized, one-to-one and small group tutoring for adults in reading, writing and math skills as well as instruction in English for speakers of other languages. The program also supports learners pursuing high school completion through the General Educational Development (GED) Test. Literacy for Life's offsite program provides classes taught by professional instructors with tutor support at area businesses, nonprofit agencies, and public schools.

Literacy for Life has helped people with numerous individual goals, including studying for and passing the U.S. citizenship exam, obtaining a better job, learning to manage family finances, passing a driver's license test, effectively communicating with medical professionals, and helping children with homework.

WALT is ready for Fall



With more than 70 classes, the WUU's unique community outreach program WALT (Williamsburg Area Learning Tree) expects to reach even more people this session. People from the WUU community along with many other talented folks are looking forward to sharing their interests and talents with the greater Williamsburg community. Recently WALT has built connections with The Confucius Institute - College of William & Mary, St. Bedes, & The Williamsburg Land Conservancy in its efforts to bring people together through the joy of

Peggy Krapf, Kevin Martin, Ruth Fraser, & Nan Piland for helping to create such a beautiful Memorial Garden centerpiece. Also, thanks to **Rob Piland** for helping with other repairs in the Garden. The new stone covering at the center and the wider stone path that leads directly to the garden will help the center to be more attractive and handicapped accessible. The new teak bench at the center will help to provide a better place for meditation and remembering. Additionally, the new ground cover around the periphery of the circle will help to add color and warmth to the circle. Rededication of the Memorial Garden will be on September 7.

We have wrapped all the exterior wood trim at Fahs House with either aluminum or vinyl. No more exterior painting. It's great to have it looking nice again, ready for the new year for the children.



The concrete benches and sundial, previously in the Memorial Garden circle, have been moved to the Labyrinth. Now the labyrinth almost has a permanent feel to it, and the sundial actually has a function.

Does the sanctuary kitchen floor sparkle again? It should, due to stripping the floor and rewaxing.

Something big to fix: James City County notified us that our two retention ponds need attention, mostly in the form of tree removal. The one next to the Memorial Garden needs immediate repair (erosion settlement at the spillway). This work is already on the list for BOF's Phase 1 work, so it came as no surprise. The goal of the Stormwater Management Program is to reduce the amount of pollutants that are discharged into our streams and rivers, a value that WUU can easily embrace.

WHAT IS STEWARDSHIP?

In its essence, stewardship is the care and support of our congregation. Our congregation is self-supporting through the contributions of each member and friend. We find spiritual growth in each other's company on Sunday mornings and when we gather in smaller groups. In our attendance, we support WUU services and programs and care for our facilities. We lend our time and talents to activities which further the WUU mission, and we invest in our WUU staff by making a pledge of support toward meeting our operating budget.

The Stewardship Committee, as a Board Committee, is charged with coordinating stewardship efforts. In addition to asking for your time, talent and treasure, we want to acknowledge and thank those who give joyously and selflessly of themselves to WUU. We are grateful for those who can give of themselves and respectful of those who are themselves in need of our support.

The WUU fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30. In February, members and friends will receive information about plans for programming and the money needed to sustain those programs in the coming year. During this time each of us will be asked to consider our commitment to WUU and to pledge a contribution which is affordable and reflects that level of commitment. Persons who sign the membership book during the year are asked to consider a pledge when they join.

Pledges from members and friends are the most important source of support to WUU. Income from pledges covers approximately 85% of annual operating expenses; for example, the present 12-month (July 2014-June 2015) budget shows expenses of \$377,000, toward which we received 182 pledges of support totaling over \$320,000. Facilities rental, the weekly offering and fundraising activities provide the remaining 20% of needed funds.

We hope that all who are able will participate in pledging to the annual fund. We know that the capacity to give varies owing to individual circumstances, and we understand that some of us can and will give more than others. There are no "dues," and pledging is not a legal requirement for WUU membership, unless you want to vote. Still, we are grateful for and take responsibility to grow this spiritual home for ourselves and as a vital and loving legacy to those who will come after us.
