Words from Rev. David A. Johnson, Incoming Interim Minister

I am writing this note just one day following the unspeakably horrifying massacre of churchgoers at a historic AME church in Charleston, South Carolina. This tragedy, and its many underlying causes, remain raw and confusing, and are calling forth the best of who we are. Undoubtedly the opportunities and challenges for WUU to re-engage and confront systemic hatred and racism will return to the forefront: Even as we light candles in the darkness and seek to bring hope where hope is hard to find.

Summer arrives in full force. For many, this is an opportunity for rest and renewal. For others, it is a time to re-focus on long-neglected tasks and opportunities. For us Interim Ministers, this is the season of farewells, sorting, packing, moving, and rediscovering new landscapes. My wife, Diann, and I are beginning to close out our obligations in Kalamazoo, Michigan. We expect to drive our two vehicles (and needed possessions, including 2 kitties) to Williamsburg during the last week of July. Through the wisdom provided by many at WUU during my apartment-hunting visit in early June, we now have housing for the next two years! One of our members, Sherri Powers, will be renting to us her home at 522 Spring Trace, in the Seasons Trace community. We expect to begin moving in on Saturday morning August 1. I will be on duty in August and preaching at summer worship services on four Sundays in August: the 2nd, 9th, 23rd, and 30th. In the August newsletter I will offer previews of these services.

This coming Sunday, June 21, you will celebrate and bid farewell to Rev. Jennifer Ryu, and honor her for her exemplary ministry at WUU over many years. This is a significant and proud occasion in WUU's history. I shall be cheering you on.

During the month of July I will remain "on call" at the church in Kalamazoo. However, I shall be in touch with many of you at WUU (mostly by phone) to help in my continuing orientation to Williamsburg and WUU. It was twenty-eight years ago when the Johnson family loaded a rental-truck and drove westward, leaving behind our home on Cape Cod, in order to settle in the prairies of eastern Kansas. That has been our family home ever since. We shall continue to maintain our Kansas home as our permanent/legal residence, and return there for items such as medical care. Even so, it is truly wonderful to be returning to the East coast, and to be within a

Joe Williams is considered the leading expert in the reconstruction of the Delsarte technique, and he has taught for prominent institutions, including the Juilliard School, the National Center of Dance in Paris, the University of Strasbourg, and more.

Spotlight on Franz Gross



From the time I was a kid living in upstate New York, I was intrigued by science and math, and was ultimately able to channel these interests into a career in theoretical physics. Following graduate school and appointments at Cornell and UC Santa Barbara, I joined the faculty at William and Mary in 1970. In addition to

teaching and research, I served in the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and also participated in the scientific planning for Jefferson Laboratory, where I later became a senior scientist. Now retired, I still enjoy research at a relaxed pace. Married for 37 years to Chris Faia, I live on the Chickahominy River, where each summer we maintain watch over an osprey pair and their offspring, and year around, try to keep up with our blended family of 6 children and 8 grandchildren.

I'm a lifetime UU and a charter member of our congregation. At age 11, my first Sunday school

experience found me in a theological conflict with my teacher (who was a Methodist!). That nearly ended my interest in what was then the Unitarian Church, but when I was in high school, I found membership in the Liberal Religious Youth (LRY) deeply satisfying, and I was present at the LRY meeting in Chautauqua when we voted to join with the Universalists.

Except for a short time in the early '70's, when my young son and I participated in an earlier Williamsburg Fellowship, I was inactive until 1989, when Chris and I joined in signing the charter for WUU. Since that time, I have been a member of the choir, have taught RE, have twice served on the Board and chaired or been a member of several committees, including RE, Finance, Personnel, Worship Associates, the web design team, and one of our search committees for an interim minister. I have also served as Treasurer. I currently serve on the Finance Committee and am very pleased to be a member of the Design/Build Team helping to plan and guide development of our new facilities.

As an atheist and a physicist, I continue to find involvement in WUU interesting, meaningful, and always challenging. Where else could I find a community of people with diverse views who still enjoy talking and debating religious philosophy with one another? I want to do all that I can to build our future, ensuring that this congregation will continue as a healthy and active force for liberal religion and social justice in our community.


2015 Social Justice Summer Mission Project

Come join in WUU's Social Justice project at South of the Ferry in Surry, a ferry ride across the river. In the past, we have gone to West Virginia--to the Southern Appalachian Folklife Center--for our Mission Trips, where needed assistance in the Pipestem area of West Virginia is identified and coordinated by their hired staff. This year, coordinators Dave Wilcox and Jessica O'Brien decided that we would like to work closer to home on a local project.

In 1985, Savannah Williams, a WUU member, purchased South of the Ferry, "a farm and forest land, to be available as an intergenerational, international community in which individuals can learn from nature and one another by sharing skills and resources that provide opportunities for self-reliance and sustainability in a caring environment." Through various projects associated with students, farmers throughout Virginia, and other volunteers, South of the Ferry has participated in the development of self-reliance and self-employment in a caring community.

Over the next few weeks, Savannah, Dave and Jessica will be identifying the work we would like to take on and setting dates for participation. Please keep our Summer Mission Project in mind as you plan your summer. We encourage teenagers and adults to join us. Stay tuned for more information.

Building Our Future: One Step at a Time

During the last few weeks, most of the Design Build Team's work has been with the Guernsey Tingle Architects. The Team is about to complete their review work in preparation for the anticipated request for proposals from sub-contractors. Once we have these bids, we will work with ET Gresham to make the final selections and have a clearer picture of the building costs. Then, with the final permits approved and the subcontractors selected, we will be able to see the preparations take place for construction.

The following table provides an overview of the activities. However, here are the critical dates:

- **September:** Move in the equipment and prepare the construction site. Mark your calendars for September 20: Ground breaking.
- **November/December:** Complete the basic exterior construction before Winter's bad weather begins.
- **May:** Complete all of the *new* building construction and begin renovations for the Gathering Hall and Commercial Kitchen. Complete site work including paving and landscaping.
- **June:** Occupy the new spaces!

- Three new picnic tables. Thanks to **Fred Bergman, Mohamad Barbarji, Allen Cooke, Franz Gross, and Les Solomon** for delivery and assembly. The tables were initiated at the Potluck, then moved to the Navigators camp out, and will take up semi-permanent residence outside Fahs and Parker. **We do need someone to volunteer to stain them.**
- The **Navigators** have started to build a fire pit near the labyrinth.
- Thanks to the **Delbos family** for offering to cut the labyrinth each week.
- The attics and tool shed have been cleaned out! Many items were sold at the yard sale and four truck loads went to recycle/dump. We need to continue this work in preparation for our new facilities with its new storage space. Every move requires making decisions about what to keep and what to say good bye to.
