#### Happy New Year! I am spending this first week of 2015 with my family in Ohio. As I leave for this short vacation, I want to share with you a book that many members of WUU read together in the summer of 2009--Eckhart Tolle's "A New Earth."

Tolle says that he took the title from a biblical passage in Revelation that points the way to a new heaven and a new earth. Rather than taking a literal understanding of these words, he sees this image as "a metaphor for the state of conscious awareness of infinite being (heaven), which continually comes forth in a new way into new form (earth)."

The Spirit of Life constantly reveals itself to us in both subtle and startling ways. Revelation comes in the form of powerful experiences--dramatic beauty, death, illness, reconciliation, forgiveness. It also comes in one perfectly formed snowflake and a hug from a child. From these experiences our notions of truth shift and grow.

As adherents of a liberal faith tradition, we do not believe that the book of truth is closed. This is what makes us a non-dogmatic faith. We are open to new truths that reveal themselves in many ways and through many teachers.

#### Minister's Article Continued ...

If you are looking for a fresh start to this new year, I recommend Tolle's work. He reveals a reality that is right here and available to anyone who will open themselves to a new truth. Here are some of his words (from www.eckharttolle.com):

"One thing we can do is to notice the little things all around us, paying attention to details such as the birds in the trees and the flowers in the garden or the park just notice the beauty everywhere, even the smallest things. To notice seemingly insignificant things requires alertness. That alertness is the key. It is the unconditioned. It is consciousness itself.

In awakened doing there is complete internal alignment with the present moment and whatever you are doing right now. The doing is then not primarily a means to an end, but an opening for consciousness to come into this world. Aligning yourself with the Now is aligning yourself with universal purpose.

Awakened doing has three modalities, depending on circumstances and the nature of the activity. They are acceptance, enjoyment, and enthusiasm. If there is neither acceptance, enjoyment, or enthusiasm in what you do, you are out of alignment with universal purpose. You are creating unhappiness, that is to say suffering in one form or another."

May this year bring you closer to a new revelation--the revelation of your life's alignment with universal purpose. May all be well. May all be happy. May all be at peace.



## **Greater Williamsburg Outreach Mission**

The Share the Plate Program will donate the entire plate collection for Sunday, January 4, to GWOM (Greater Williamsburg Outreach Mission). This local nonprofit – chartered in 2012 - has grown from 11 to 21 faith groups, focused on the spiritual practice of assisting the homeless population in our local communities. Our WUU representative is Helen Hansen, who also serves on the board and executive committee.

GWOM representatives collaborate with other stakeholders to learn about the needs of our homeless population and create action plans to assist.

Three years ago, GWOM helped initiate the Community of Faith Mission Emergency Homeless Shelter program. This winter, WUU will host the Winter Shelter February 15-22

Greater Williamsburg Outreach Mission is currently planning a pilot program to open a year round Day Shelter that will offer respite, hope, and access to services, with the hope of helping those in need develop successful independence and self sufficiency. This is a substantial commitment of resources for this long term initiative, so GWOM is seeking funding from its members as well as outside sources. ## **Community of Faith Mission (COFM) Homeless Shelter**




This year WUU will host the COFM homeless shelter February 15-22.

We've heard the "truth" about a capital campaign, "prayed" over its outcome, and realized the "miracle" of its apparent outcome. The rest is to be "revealed" in the coming months as the budgeting and planning leads to a February vote on the final project.

Given all that has happened in the last few months, and all that each of us has committed to the future success of our congregation, it seems almost inconsiderate to ask you to give more time, talent and treasure to WUU. Yet, for our common vision to be revealed, we need to invest further in our dreams for this religious community.

Your Finance Committee and Board have adopted a three year budget, and your Stewardship Committee has been meeting for the last few months in preparation for the 2015-16 annual canvass. Our upcoming goal of \$331,000 to fund WUU programs from July 1, 2015-June 30, 2016 is possible with everyone's support. After all, we have received pledges of over \$327,000 from 190 households in our congregation for the current year operations.

As we approach the annual canvass in February, please share your thoughts, concerns, and dreams with the Stewardship Committee. We want the canvass to be a short and productive process, and we welcome your ideas on how to improve.

We also appreciate your timely responses. Please continue to support the annual operations of our congregation by your generous contributions to the annual canvass when it commences on February 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Thank you for making our vision a revelation to us all.


