March's Spiritual Theme is "Justice"

Wherever there is an absence of love, injustice can take root. Love in this case is not the affection we feel for our spouses and friends. This love requires neither affection nor fondness. It comes when we are able to see the full humanity of another person and the full "being-ness" of creatures and the Creation. When we can see the Truth and Reality of the other, there is Love. In the presence of this love, it is impossible to be apathetic about the suffering of others. As we witness the suffering of whales caught in fishing nets, children used as suicide bombers, families without homes, civilians trapped by war, land stripped for coal, or women assaulted by their partners, we can see injustice rise in the absence of love.

The good news is that the power of love is strong, and all of life grows in that direction. As a people of faith, we have the special task of reminding others and ourselves of this truth. The various faith communities will package this good news in different ways, but they are saying the same thing--Love is the Way. And our spiritual practices help us to grow in our capacity to see the full humanity and the full being-ness of others.

With this religious understanding of love and injustice, we are called to "stand on the side of love" (www. standingonthesideoflove.org). This means standing outside of the culture. It means taking our bodies and voices to places that make us targets for criticism, ostracism, and vilification. This may be more than some of you signed up for when you found this pretty little white sanctuary backed into a quiet wooded lot on Ironbound Road. Perhaps you came to find new friends and to hear beautiful music and poetry.

Yes, we have that. But remember that all of that beauty is a means to a greater good. It helps us to renew our souls, to open our hearts, to learn to love, so that we can once again go into the world to preach the good news!

News From The Board President



CHANGE -- is this the state in which WUU forever is to be? According to a UU minister in Texas and editor of the Good News Journal, it is, if we are truly a spiritual faith community:

"When we understand that constant change, at least gradual constant change, is the spiritual playing field, we approach the challenges of change -- such as dealing with loss and the sense of insecurity as well as new opportunities for growth and learning -- as a deep, intentional, regular practice of what life in a faith community is all about." The Rev. Tony Lorenzen

Change certainly seems to be our lifestyle. We're changing our ministerial leadership as Jennifer takes a new path on her own life journey; we're changing the look and scope of our physical home to provide quality space for our children and facilities to further our mission; we're even changing the look of our webpage to make ourselves more readily visible. We're not a stagnant people. We hold close these, plus other, change challenges. Yes, we mourn losses and feel insecure sometimes not knowing exactly what lies ahead, but yet we do move ahead, embracing new opportunities. We must then agree with Rev. Lorenzen that we are right on, we are a healthy spiritual faith community.


To help meet the challenges of change, the Board and its committees deliberate and resolve some of the hard issues that make it possible for us to further the WUU mission.

- E.T. Gresham has been hired as the building general contractor to work with Guernsey Tingle Architects and our Design Build Team in pre-construction work that includes finalizing the expansion/renovation design and the costs thereof. Should the congregation agree with the plans, the Gresham firm will continue as general contractor through construction.
- NOTE: During their first meeting together on February 25th, it became clear that changing the Congregational Meeting, originally scheduled for March 29, to May 3 will be to everyone's advantage, giving ample time to prepare best possible estimates of construction costs, prepare details of the final design and financing, and prepare other detailed information you will need in order to vote on moving forward. This would be a vote of conditional approval, meaning that, if significant changes in design, cost or financing are needed, those changes would be taken to you for a second round of approval. Otherwise, the construction process would proceed as described at the upcoming Congregational Meeting.
- Members of the Finance Committee and the Building Our Future Steering Committee have interviewed several local lending institutions regarding WUU securing a mortgage of \$800,000 to supplement the Capital Campaign pledges of approximately \$1,400,000 to fund the building project. News from them will soon be available.
- On recommendation from the UUA Transition Office, the Board voted to begin the search for a 2-year Interim Minister to start work here in August or September. Three members of the Board -- Jim Kent, Finance Committee Chair; Dave Neiman, Building Our Future Steering Committee; and Lola Warren, Board President -- will serve as the search team. The Search Committee for a Settled Minister will be formed by the congregation after the Interim is on board.
- The Board is working towards its own changes, as new members take office on May 1st. A retreat is being planned for orientation of new members, evaluation of this past year's work, and setting goals for the coming year. More challenges, more changes, more spiritual growth are anticipated.
- As always, you are invited to attend Board meetings, held the 4th Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm in Fahs.

Friday, March 13th, 6pm, Social Justice Potluck and Movie


Bring a dish to share and come watch "American Denial," a film by PBS's Independent Lens.


