What's New at WUU?

Welcome to summer at WUU! While we savor the warmer weather and the chance to move a little more slowly, there is still quite a lot going on as we get ready for the fall. Let me give you a sneak preview of what's coming up.

This fall, we'll offer new opportunities to connect with fellow WUUs, work on your own spiritual life, and serve the community:

- Small group ministry signups are coming this fall! We'll be launching several small groups connected to the Soul Matters monthly worship themes and led by trained facilitators. Look for signup opportunities in late September.
- Have you heard about the new **Hospitality Ministry**? Each Sunday, it takes a village (or at least a lot of volunteers) to welcome visitors, serve as ushers, and provide refreshments. Beginning this fall, each congregant, from preschoolers to age 100, will become part of one of seven teams to provide these welcoming activities for one or two months during the year. More information will be coming soon, beginning with a café conversation after the service on July 8. Please plan to attend to find out and discuss the details. It's going to be a fun, WUU family undertaking.

We've also been noticing that on some Sundays, the parking lot is getting pretty full, and the sanctuary and religious classrooms are too. This is a great problem to have. Our board and I believe this is the right time to think seriously about how we can make more room for newcomers and long-time members alike to participate on Sunday mornings. To that end, this summer we'll be putting together a task force to study our **two worship services** and make recommendations on how we can keep on making room for all who are drawn to this congregation and its message of radical love, social engagement, and warm community.

Meanwhile, behind the scenes, we're also making significant **IT improvements** to help congregants connect and work together more easily:

- Many of you have been asking for a better, more accurate congregational directory. It's almost here! In August, we'll be rolling out a new congregational software package that will include an always-up-to-date and easily printable directory, easy signups for classes, and online giving.
 There's also a smartphone app that will let you call and text fellow congregants directly from the app. To preview the software, visit https://www.breezechms.com/.
- We'll also be setting up Google Drive **file-sharing** for all our ministry teams and committees in time for the start of the program year in September.

You'll be hearing more soon about all these initiatives. In the meantime, please thank our hard-working staff members when you see them, and our many dedicated lay leaders too. I'm excited about where we're headed together, and I hope you will be too.

Of course, in the midst of much that is new, we will also continue much that is familiar and important. We will gather for worship and learning, we will care for one another, and we will continue the work of justice and service which is so vital in these times. As we move forward together, I thank each and every one of you for the faith, love, hard work, and good will that you bring to this congregation and to our world.

Board Report ALL ARE CALLED: FY1819 and beyond

"All Are Called" was the theme of the General Assembly in Kansas City. The highlights of FY1819 reflects our answers to this call:

- Rev. Laura arrives and starts her ministry with us on the Charlottesville weekend.
- Joe Cross is hired to help us manage our facilities—now and into the future.
- Regional staff person Kathy McGowan joins our leadership teams to launch Rev. Laura's ministry at WUU.
- We grew in our understanding of how to provide safe environments for all at WUU.
- We welcomed many new friends and members as they came seeking WUU's Beloved Community.
- Financially, we ended the year in the black and we developed a progressive program for the future that is projected to be in the black—the first time in several years.
- With our Building our Future program behind us, we filled our leadership and support positions with energetic and experienced personnel.
- We shared our values with the community at the lemonade stand, Moral Mondays, the Village, local forums and protests, Washington DC, Charlottesville, Richmond and other venues.
- We developed and the Board approved a 3-year Strategic Plan **Here** that we will begin to implement this month!

The Strategic Plan provides a map to the ways we can answer this call. Yet, it is a working document. The events in the news about children being taken away from their parents, the decisions on social justice actions reached at our General Assembly in Kansas City (immigration and end of ICE, incarnation reform, etc.), the moving sermons and lectures at GA, and the ongoing work of our own WUU teams in the last few weeks are reminders that Love Resists so we must be creative, flexible, and compassionate as we seek the right balance between plans and emerging opportunities/needs.

I am confident that we will be guided by our principles and hearts as, together, we come to realize that the GA's theme "All Are Called" means we will be called in new, sometimes challenging, ways in FY1819.

New Class Forming - Lay Pastoral Care Associate (LPCA) Training

The current team of 11 WUU Lay Pastoral Care Associates is ending its first three year term of service. Six have chosen to stay on, while three have asked to step down and two have moved over to full-time duties on the Caring Team. The CT back up the minister as the first responders to immediate and short term crises and acute needs among the congregation. LPCAs, on the other hand, have special training to offer longer term pastoral support to more enduring or more complex UU adversities, under the direction of the minister.

At this point it is time to solicit applications from those interested in volunteering for replacement LPCA positions. Applicants must be members of WUU, must agree to about 10 hours of train-ing by the minister in the Fall, must subscribe to strict confidentiality codes, and must be pre-pared to offer their time and energy at roughly six hours per month for an expected tour of three years. Most service time would be scheduled at your convenience. Applicants are invited to fill out the form available **Here** or you may pick up a hard copy in the office, and submit it to co-leaders David Hopkinson or Jane Reilly. All who apply will be interviewed in early Fall by the minister and the co-leaders, who will select members of the new training class





Jamison Miller came to Williamsburg in 2011 after completing his BA in Chicago and MA in Vancouver - both in urban geography - experiences that spurred his commitment to working for socio-spatial justice. Jamison is now finishing his Ph.D. at the W&M School of Education, where he has been researching the open education movement which is working to contest the constraints of copyright and make education more accessible for all. He started working at Lumen Learning this summer, helping faculty to adopt open educational resources at colleges and universities across the northeastern US. Both of his children, August (7) and Lulu (4) are active in the Navigators group (how we first heard about WUU) and the RE program. We're all excited about enriching our spiritual lives through engagement with the WUU community and beyond. We've already felt so welcomed and are grateful to be here.



Joe Galano taught Psychology at the College of William and Mary for 33 years, specializing in the area of child abuse and neglect prevention. He spent two decades partnering with Prevent Child Abuse Virginia/America. Although he has lived in various places in the U.S. for his education, including New Mexico, Colorado, Ohio, and New Jersey, he's a proud Brooklynite who had concerns about moving to Williamsburg in 1977 when the only Italian restaurant listed in the yellow pages was Pizza Hut. Beverly Peterson grew up in Fairfax, lived in Smithfield, graduated from the College of William and Mary (three times) and taught English in high schools and at Thomas Nelson Community College, Old Dominion University, Penn State Fayette Campus, and William and Mary. Her specializations were American Literature-particularly literature by and about enslaved people--and research writing about global warming. Both Bev and Joe were recognized by their institutions for excellence in teaching. One factor that drew them to this community was seeing WUU members at many rallies and events advocating for political, social justice, and child development causes that they care about. Another was having many WUU friends who never cajoled them to visit, leading Bev and Joe to figure that the members were trying to keep a good thing to themselves. All of these friends have made Bev and Joe feel very welcome.

WUU B & B is Back!

WUU is back in the B&B business. Fourteen of you have signed up to host, either routinely or occasionally, for fellow UUs coming to the area for short-term stays as we look to provide additional WUU income. Our first guests are coming at the end of June. But we want more.

How are we spreading the word besides this newsletter? Myriad ways: We now have a B&B link on our WUU website, have put an ad in the June UU World, have joined UU're Home, where our listing will continue for a year, plan to add info to Facebook, and are forming partnerships with a few other UU congregations, exchanging B&B information through our congregational newsletters.




Way to go Social Justice Book Club!
