At a gathering of local clergy the other day, we were talking about how our various religious traditions tried to serve the common good. When it got to be my turn, what I shared with my colleagues is the truth: that I am humbled every day by the people in my congregation and all that you do to try to make a difference in this world. I told them, you all are out there living your values, working hard to serve our community, and frankly I'm just trying to keep up with you! Listening to your stories of why you serve, I know it's not just because you're looking for something to do with your free time. I hear in your stories a commitment to a vision of justice, a longing for a world where everyone is treated with respect and compassion. This is what gives us the strength and the persistence to get the "tasks and work" done.

So, too, our congregation has a vision for our future. Service is a big part of it. I'm especially excited about two new initiatives you'll be hearing about this fall. There will be tasks and work to be done. I know we will do them in the service of our deepest longings for healing in this world.

Other changes will be coming too. On Sunday mornings, we'll be experimenting with our new hospitality teams. We'll be considering other changes to our Sunday morning worship and religious education experience, too, to be as welcoming as we can possibly be to newcomers and longtime members alike. Worship times may shift. We may ask you to accept some new ideas. It may feel like work! But it will be in the service of our congregation's growing more and more into what we are meant to be—a community open to all, welcoming to all who are drawn to this free faith.

This February, WUU will celebrate our 30th anniversary as a congregation. What better time could there be to make a fresh commitment to a vision for our future? As we enter into this new congregational year, I ask you to bring your longings, your love, and your willingness to serve. It's time to set sail!

Lessons learned from history and in the name of righteousness persevere, and ultimately, we hope, for the greater good. Rev. Dr. Clark will explore the Biblical story from Matthew concerning the beheading of John the Baptist, and relate that to events that occurred in the Jim Crow era, not so very long ago. Lynching was used during that time to instill fear and exert control — to preserve white supremacy and to suppress black civil rights. Fortunately, we currently find actions that demonstrate the inherent goodness in humanity. Coupled with the desire to learn from history and to find justice and compassion for all, The Equal Justice Initiative, at its newly opened National Memorial for Peace and Justice, identifies more than 4,400 victims of lynchings in the United States between 1877 and 1950. What lessons have we learned, and how may we guide our actions always to the ultimate good for all?

## **Share the Plate for September**

(NOTE. The September Share the Plate collection will be on the third Sunday rather than our usual second Sunday.)

On Sunday, September 16, we are introducing a newcomer to the Share the Plate lineup - the STP recipient will be Hampton Roads Refugee Relief (HR3). Their mission is "to promote self-sufficiency and wellness of refugees resettling in Hampton Roads." The organization provides refugees with additional education, links them with employers, assists with housing and transportation, familiarizes them with available social services, assists with medical care and more. These activities ease the transition to the United States and make sure refugees have every opportunity to succeed and become productive members of society.



HR3 is a relatively young organization, obtaining its non-profit status about one year ago. It has operated thus far on donations from several individuals and the good will of volunteers (including WUUs) determined to welcome and assist these refugee families to the best of their abilities with limited resources. Each Sunday, families, primarily from Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan, and Morocco, meet at a Boys and Girls Club in Newport News to participate in Islamic studies/prayer in a safe environment, learn English and share a provided lunch, all thanks to dedicated volunteers. There are also special speakers and events, such as immigration attorneys and health fairs. Please give generously to this organization and show WUU support for the safety and well-being of these new members of our community and to send the strong message that they are welcome here! ## **Soul Matters Covenant Groups Coming Soon!**



After last spring's successful pilot program, this fall WUU is launching new Soul Matters groups open to everyone in the congregation. Soul Matters groups are a new kind of small group, connected to our monthly worship themes, with a unique practice component that helps us not just think about the themes, but live them.

All are welcome to a café conversation introducing the Soul Matters groups on Sunday, September 23 right after the 11:15 worship service. Signups will begin that week.

### What are Soul Matters groups?

Soul Matters groups invite people to deepen their connection to self, others, and spirit, through regular monthly meetings and reflection and spiritual practice on your own. The groups ask you to make a commitment to do your own inner work in between meetings—it's more than just showing up once a month—but many participants have found the added structure and depth to be deeply rewarding. Another key feature of the groups is, when we gather, we listen to one another. Soul Matters groups aren't discussion groups. We don't give each other advice. What we do is listen, and in the listening, many participants have found that they hear their own inner wisdom more clearly than they ever have before.

To get a better taste of Soul Matters, check out a sample group packet <u>here</u>. Group members will receive similar packets each month.

What's the time commitment? Soul Matters groups meet once a month for 2 hours, plus reflection and practice time on your own. Groups will ask for a commitment of one year.

**How do I get involved?** Signups will begin later this month. We'll announce the signup link in the weekly Spiral email. Signups will be first-come, first-served.

What if I have more questions? If you can, come to the café conversation on Sunday, September 23. Soul Matters facilitators will be there along with Rev. Laura to introduce you to the groups and answer any questions you may have. Or, if you can't make it, contact Rev. Laura to learn more.

## **Board Report**

## **Reflections on Transitions and Our New Strategic Plan**

The Board meeting in August was the first meeting since we adopted a new Strategic Plan in June. Already, we have found how important it is to review our work in the light of our new plan.

- Two worship services. This is a critical need if we are to grow, yet finding the right fit for WUU has been a challenge. The Board enthusiastically endorsed Rev. Laura's outline of task force work and appointed Rachel Delbos as the Board's representative.
- Becoming a Partner Congregation. Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy (VICPP) representatives Wayne Moyer and John Whitley recommended to the Board that WUU become a Partner Congregation. The first question was how that fits in with the Social Justice part of the Strategic Plan. With the support of Social Justice Co-chairs Helen Hansen and Jessica Sapalio, the Board endorsed the recommendation. WUU is now a Partner Congregation, joining a host of congregations including five other UU congregations.
- Walt Learning Tree. The Board received a request for more than \$7,000 from the WLT Steering Committee for the next year. This request was an unbudgeted surprise. The Board moved to provide funding to cover the expected deficit for the fall semester to support WLT and it will make a decision about the spring semester later this fall. The Board understands that WLT has a long history, yet the Board and Rev. Laura have responsibilities to evaluate WLT's future role in the context of staff resources, fiduciary responsibilities, employment practices, competing priorities, and the Strategic Plan—all important considerations as we grow and mature.

Other more routine Board actions related to the approval of a plan to promote the Meditation Memorial Garden program, approving a gift of a new piece of playground equipment, and selecting new leadership for our Annual Giving Committee.

Speaking of leadership, we were saddened to learn that Board Vice President Ty Alexander has resigned for health reasons. Ty will be sorely missed for his compassion, executive experience, thoughtful leadership and diversity perspective.

Our By-Laws state that the Vice President shall also serve as Personnel Chair and states that the Board may fill a vacancy until the next congregational election. That, in turn, set in motion a series of discussions about how to reassign our Board responsibilities with a minimum of drama.

Drumroll please, effective September 1:

- Meet New Board Member Ariel BenYishay! Ariel will serve on the Board until May. Welcome Ariel!
- Meet President Jessica O'Brien! She will serve as our Board leader for the reminder of the year (until May).
- Meet Vice President and Personnel Chair Les Solomon! I will serve in this role until the end of my term in May.

It has been an amazing experience to serve as either your Board president or Building our Future chair since 2012. Thank you for your continuing support and trust. During this period, WUU has grown in so many ways. I look

forward to growing with you in the years ahead.



A native of Los Angeles, I have lived in Williamsburg since 1970. I was fortunate to have a rewarding career in healthcare, as an administrator for inpatient services including a substance abuse program and programs for acute psychiatric treatment and acute medical care Before retiring in 2004, my final work was as executive director of Hospice Support Care of Williamsburg, during which time we planned and built the Hospice House, which began admitting patients and families in 2002.

Franz Gross and I have been married for 40 years, and until eight years ago our home was in Williamsburg within walking distance to his office at the College of William and Mary. He and I now live on the Chickahominy River, where we enjoy gorgeous sunsets, vivid changes of season and watching the osprey couple that returns each spring to build a nest and raise its young on a platform next to our dock. Our move to the river has meant an 18 mile "commute" to town, but we are that much closer to Richmond where a daughter, two grandsons and my sister live, and where I travel every week to the Virginia museum's ceramics studio.

As a feminist and political activist, I was on the organizing committee for Virginia Women's Political Caucus, chaired the Williamsburg City Democratic Committee, volunteered for local, state and national political candidates and served as secretary of the City's electoral board. Nonpartisan community service has included volunteering for hospice and serving on the corporate board for Williamsburg Landing. Along with Franz, I am a charter member of WUU, and in early days when services were held at the library, my job was to help Melissa Ackley who was in charge of hospitality. Wearing my healthcare hat, I served on our first minister's pastoral care committee and on the first RE committee and later taught RE. I joined the first team of worship associates, and served two terms on the board, including a year as president. Following board service, I chaired the stewardship committee for two years, and last fall, on completing three years as co-chair of the RE committee, decided that would be my final role in a leadership position. Today I am on the caring committee roster and helping Sue Walkley tend the playground garden. Recently, listening to Lola Warren describe the new Sunday morning hospitality teams' rotation in the year ahead, I realized that on taking my turn, I will have come full circle as a WUU volunteer!

## **Social Justice**

Several members of the immigration team have been researching possible needs of the undocumented immigrant community in WJCC. We have talked to immigration attorneys, Child Development Resource, Virginia Interfaith Center, First UU Richmond (they have a family in sanctuary), elected officials, and other members of the faith community in WJCC. We know that ICE has contracted with the VPRJ to house detainees, and that there are many undocumented families in the area. We have some ideas for projects locally that will be announced in the Spiral as they are developed.

First UU Richmond has a need for volunteers to be in the building constantly to protect Abbie, their person in sanctuary. If you would like to join a team at First UU Richmond, or would like to join our WUUSJ Immigration team, please contact <a href="mailto:sjchair@wuu.org">sjchair@wuu.org</a>.

Virginia Interfaith Center has developed a program called Circles of Protection. If you are interested in providing transportation to our undocumented neighbors to the north, please contact Leslie Waters, <a href="mailto:cvsntransportation@gmail.com">cvsntransportation@gmail.com</a> and tell her you are a member of WUU. A working knowledge of Spanish is helpful, but not necessary.

For the past year, our Transportation Circle has been an incredible group of volunteers dedicated to providing transportation to our undocumented neighbors to:

- ICE check-ins in Fairfax
- ISAP check-ins in Midlothian
- Immigration Court in Arlington
- Trips home from detention
- USCIS appointments in Norfolk
- Transportation to family members of those in public sanctuary.

The need is growing, and additional volunteers are desperately needed.

## The Grit of Kids by Austen Petersen, Director of Religious Education

We had such a wonderful failure in religious education today.

Helen Hansen and Jessica O'Brien transported us to 1950s Montgomery, Alabama this past Sunday in Children's Chapel. As the children entered the room, we all sang Ain't Nobody Gonna Turn Me Around. We sang together and talked about the grit of the Grimke sisters (click for more information). Helen and Jessica had a wonderful lesson plan worked out. They'd poured much love and attention into this session, and we were going to divide the children into two groups. The groups would take turns pretending to be black and white on the city bus in Montgomery, and we'd talk about how it felt to be black during that time and what courage Rosa Parks had.


Before I tell you what happened next, take a deep breath and remember what it was like to be five years old. Do you remember how strange adults sometimes seemed? Perhaps you felt like you had to ask permission for everything - permission to wear an outfit, permission to leave the classroom, permission to go to the swing set. Saying "no" to an adult authority figure was hard, wasn't it? In this classroom, the kids had three adult authority figures.

We all arranged the big foam cubes in order to make believe it was the bus. We had signs set up saying one section was for "whites" only and the other section was for "colored" people only, just like the Rosa Parks story. We divided the kids up into two groups, and Jessica pretended to be the bus driver. Austen pretended to be Rosa Parks, and Helen pretended to be the police officer. The bus driver told Rosa that she had to move, but Rosa didn't move. The bus driver told her again to move, but she still didn't budge. Finally, the bus driver called in the police officer (Helen), who arrested Rosa and took her to jail. Just as the officer arrived, the kids all stood up, grabbed the signs, and said "nope, this stinks. We're not doing this." Together, they carried the signs into the corner of the room and erased the words "white" and "colored." They looked at the police officer and at Rosa and said "See? Now there's no problem, everyone can sit together." The kids dismantled the system.





We, the "teachers," were stunned and incredibly happy. We congratulated the children on their grit. After all, they'd just stood up to the teachers and the game, totally refusing to play a game with crooked rules. We went into our reflection room, the room with all the tables, and each child made a drawing, comic book, or written statement about how they felt about the experience. I'll let the kids have the final word.

## **Shamanic Journeying & Drumming at WUU**

This fall, WUU is launching a new spiritual practice opportunity: a monthly shamanic journey circle, led by Rev. Laura's husband John B. Ludwig, an advanced student with Michael Harner's **Foundation for Shamanic Studies** (FSS). Shamanic journeying is a practice known to almost every human culture. The "Core Shamanism" taught by FSS is particularly designed to give Westerners access to this ancient spiritual tradition. The techniques taught are safe and drug-free, using drums or rattles to help students alter their consciousness and journey to unseen realms beyond our ordinary reality.

If you'd like to try shamanic journeying, John will be leading a basic workshop in October:

### Introduction to Shamanic Journeying

Saturday, Oct. 6, 4-6 p.m. in the Little Sanctuary at WUU

The workshop will introduce participants to the shamanic worldview and provide opportunities to journey to the Lower and Upper Worlds of classical shamanic cosmology.

Open to all adults and high school youth, no prior experience required. Most journeys are done while seated or lying down. Chairs are provided, but bring cushions, yoga mats, and/or blankets as you desire. An eye cover (such as a sleep mask or bandanna) is recommended, as is a journal for taking notes. Feel free to bring a drum and/or rattle. Movement or dance is encouraged, but not required to participate.
