A People of Sanctuary

This month our theme is this: What does it mean to be a people of Sanctuary?

In worship, on Oct. 7 we'll explore the contemporary "Sanctuary movement" to protect vulnerable immigrants. All are encouraged to come to a café conversation after the second service to learn about how WUUs can help. Then on Oct. 23 we'll consider ancient spiritual teachings on creating "sanctuary" for ourselves within our own minds and hearts.

And we are beginning a new and important conversation about the Sunday morning experience of being in our own WUU sanctuary and religious education classrooms. Right now, our 11:15 Sunday service is pretty crowded. Many of us love the energy of so many people coming together. As your minister, it's wonderful to look out on a "full house" each morning. But in some ways, we are a little too crowded. Sometimes latecomers have trouble finding seats together in the sanctuary. And even in our spacious new religious education classrooms, we're starting to experience some crowding.

At our 9:45 service, on the other hand, average attendance is hovering around 15 people. While some visitors enjoy the intimate, quiet feel of the service, others are put off by the small size of the group. Meanwhile, it typically takes two professional staff (me and Dave Robbins) and upwards of 10 volunteers (worship associate, AV tech, ushers, greeters, other hospitality volunteers) to pull off the service. I am not convinced this model is sustainable.

Our board and I believe the time has come to get creative! We want each service here at WUU to be vital, sustainable, and welcoming to newcomers. In that spirit, we have convened a "Two-Services Task Force" to study what's working well and not so well on Sundays, to explore ways of making things better, and ultimately to recommend changes in our Sunday-morning model to the board and me. The members of the task force are Eva Burke, John Chowning, Lesa Craig, Rachel Delbos, Paul Luchsinger, Austen Petersen, Janna Roche, and me.

And we will need your help! This fall, the task force will be setting up focus groups, one-on-one interviews, surveys, and congregation-wide conversations about the Sunday morning experience. Please participate as you can. We need everybody's feedback to make the very best decision about how to move forward. With your help, we will make our own WUU sanctuary even more welcoming to the countless people who need our message of love and justice, and the community of belonging that we cherish so much. May it be so.


This fall, the Board has been wrestling with questions about the future of WLT, Williamsburg Area Learning Tree, which has been experiencing financial difficulties and came to the WUU Board for funding. We have agreed to finance only the fall semester. What does the future hold for WLT? It might decide to align more closely with our WUU mission and Strategic Plan by weaving into our WUU Religious Education program, focusing on classes connected to spirituality, such as the present Meditation and Yoga offerings. Or, perhaps WLT would benefit from becoming independent of WUU, establishing its own non-profit organization in the community. These are some of the questions that members of the WLT and WUU boards will consider over the next few months.

Do you attend the early morning service on Sundays or do you prefer the 11:15 service? Maybe you attend them both from time to time? Share the Plate for October

On Sunday, October 14, we are introducing a newcomer to the Share the Plate lineup - the STP recipient will be Hampton Roads Refugee Relief (HR3). Their mission is "to promote self-sufficiency and wellness of refugees resettling in Hampton Roads." The organization provides refugees with additional education, links them with employers, assists with housing and transportation, familiarizes them with available social services, assists with medical care and more. These activities ease the transition to the United States and make sure refugees have every opportunity to succeed and become productive members of society.



HR3 is a relatively young organization, obtaining its non-profit status about one year ago. It has operated thus far on donations from several individuals and the good will of volunteers (including WUUs) determined to welcome and assist these refugee families to the best of their abilities with limited resources. Each Sunday, families, primarily from Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan, and Morocco, meet at a Boys and Girls Club in Newport News to participate in Islamic studies/prayer in a safe environment, learn English and share a provided lunch, all thanks to dedicated volunteers. There are also special speakers and events, such as immigration attorneys and health fairs. Please give generously to this organization and show WUU support for the safety and well-being of these new members of our community and to send the strong message that they are welcome here!
